Moko Club Huntly



We have had a busy year undertaking development programmes as well as fundraising and continuing with our key projects.

Tui Trust Key Projects

Transition to School Programme

Working with whānau transitioning their tamariki into primary school.

Tamariki School Starter Pack Project

Supports the provision of uniform and stationery for families that do not meet the criteria of WINZ subsidies and suffer genuine financial hardship.

Tamariki sponsorship

Moko Club delivers in areas where there are social and behavioral challenges, low incomes and/or poverty. With the help of Tui Trust, tamariki have access to ECE so that financial hardship is not a barrier.



A free home visiting programme delivered by Kōwhai Consulting. Family Start focuses on improving children's growth and health, learning, family circumstances, environment and safety. Contact Clinical Team Leader on 0800 323 543.



Maara Kai Project

Moko Clubs have been developing a Garden Growing Programme to incorporate gardens in the home. This is a way to empower whanau to grow their own gardens and subsidise their food bills as well as eat healthy organic food.

Moko Club Badge System

The Manaaki Moko Club Badge system was launched in 2017 and are based on seven Moko Club values:

- Kaitiaki Environmental Guardian Rangatira Leadership
- Toi Māori Visual Arts
- Whakaari Performing Arts
- Maara Kai Food and Gardening Tinana Health and Hygiene
- Manaaki Looking after others

The badge system aims to build confidence, provide tamariki with goals and a sense of achievement and acknowledge learning milestones.

Future Developments

Moko Gym

We wish to undertake research that builds on studies that validate the connection between active learning and increasing brain development in children. We will work alongside Jumping Beans, a NZ business that empowers whānau to raise happy, healthy and self-regulating children through the provision of preschool activities and learning which leads to improved physical, emotional, social and cognitive development.

This partnership seeks to incorporate a cultural context where Māori cultural movements based on traditional mau rakau (Māori martial arts) and kapa haka (performing arts) are included. There are a number of traditional Māori activities, games and actions that are culturally appropriate for the development of a Moko Gym programme. This concept appeals to the nature of our Moko Club whānau who are predominantly Māori and enjoy sporting competition. Moko Gym will be designed to nourish the mind, body and spirit of our children attending the centre.

Kete Kai Project

This concept arose out of a need to support whanau facing extreme poverty. Some whanau not familiar with a lot of the fruits and vegetables that Moko Club provides at harvesting time. We want to develop a programme where we can provide easy to use recipes and send a Moko Club Kete Kai home once a week to support all Moko Club whānau.

This programme will raise whanau awareness around healthy eating and preparing healthy kai. This is an extension of the Maara Kai programme. We are currently exploring the idea of building a community kai pantry that will be located in Huntly and Ngāruawāhia. We want to support all whānau and help generate greater involvement from other community members to contribute kai that they might have in plentiful numbers.

Website

Our intent is to develop a Tui Trust website that will be a hub of information for our tamariki, whānau, community, sponsors and supporters. We are currently seeking partnerships for these future developments. Phone Lee on 07 846 1254 for further information.



The following highlights work undertaken by Tui Trust and Moko Club

Whānau Assistance

We assist families to address social issues that can impede tamariki participation in Moko Club. These issues include, but are not limited to:

- Domestic violence advice and referrals.
- Referrals to addiction services.
- ✓ Advocating and mediating between families and WINZ.
- ✓ Advice around health issues i.e. severe eczema and lice infestation.
- ✓ Health advocacy with mobile dental, ear and health clinics.
- ✓ Brokering housing support arrangements.
- ✓ Advice around healthy living environments and eating.
- ✓ Provide transport to appointments.

Examples of Facilitation

- ✓ Support whānau to fill in WINZ forms.
- ✓ Make appointments with the mobile dental, hearing and eye clinics, doctors.
- ✓ Connect with the respective food banks in Ngāruawāhia and Huntly.
- ✓ We work closely with Waahi Whanui in Huntly when whānau are displaced from homes due to house sales and increased rentals.
- ✓ Refer whānau to professional health services to assist with alcohol, drug and addiction issues.

School Starter Pack Project - Enables best possible start

The 'Tamariki School Starter Pack Project' helps relieve the financial pressures when children start school for whanau that do not meet the criteria of WINZ. We support children turning five with this pack. The starter pack costs \$450.00 and includes everything a child needs to start school:

- √ Stationery
- ✓ School bag
- ✓ Lunch box

- ✓ Drink bottle
- ✓ Shoes and socks
- ✓ Undergarments
- ✓ Brand new school uniform or set of clothing

The child will also receive a birthday cake for turning 5, balloons, gift, reading book, sticker book and party fun for the Moko Club children and whanau . The first year school donations/fees are paid directly to the school.


This initiative gives children a sense of pride, builds self-esteem and selfreliance. Being prepared enables children the best possible start to school so that they are ready to learn.
